<u>Grade 7—</u>78% of student received a 2 or higher on their provincial report card in the areas of reading and writing.

<u>Grade 8 -</u> 84% of students received a 2 or higher on the provincial report card in the areas of reading and writing. 12% did not complete the grade 8 ELA program.

7-8 Numeracy Data

<u>Grade 7—</u> 71% of students received a 2 or more on the provincial report card in the areas of knowledge and understanding of numeracy and problem solving. 64% of students received a 2 or more on the provincial report card in the area of mental math.

<u>Grade 8—</u> 72% of students received a 2 or more on the provincial report card in the area of knowledge and understanding of numeracy and problem solving. 76% of students received a 2 or more in the area of mental math on the provincial report.







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Priorities for 2023-24

Cultural Proficiency

By June of the 2023-24 school year, 100% of teachers will continue to infuse cultural perspective, specifically Indigenous knowledge, into the curriculum. On a school-wide level we will continue to infuse cultural perspectives into our daily activities. We will focus on the use of the new Mamahtawisiwin document and the global competencies from Manitoba Ed. The purpose of our work is to expose all students to the truth of Canada's past, and how to move forward towards reconciliation. Our hope is that all student "see" themselves within the school and feel that who they are is respected.

Mental Health and Wellness

By June of 2024, we will aspire to increase all students sense of belonging, self worth, connection, and self advocacy. We will continue to provide opportunities for our students, staff, and communities to build and strengthen relationships. We will continue to provide strategies and awareness of what living in a good way looks like and help students define that for themselves.

Literacy

- By June 2024, 80% of Grade 7 and 8 students will achieve a minimum of a 2 on the provincial report card in the areas of reading and writing.
- In grades 7-12, using data from Read Theory, provincial report card, and teacher assessments we would like to see 80% of students progress by one grade level per year. The emphasis will be on comprehension, extension, critical learning, and reading to learn.



 In 9-12 level courses, we would like 80% of students to receive 70% or higher in their course work and 100% complete their credit.

Numeracy

- By June 2024, 80% of students in grade 7 and 8
 will achieve a minimum of 2 (a basic to good understanding of concepts and skills) in all areas of
 numeracy on the provincial report card (numeracy
 knowledge, mental math, and problem solving).
- By June 2024, 80% of students in grade 9-12 level math courses will receive a minimum of 70% or higher in their course work and 100% complete their credit.
